

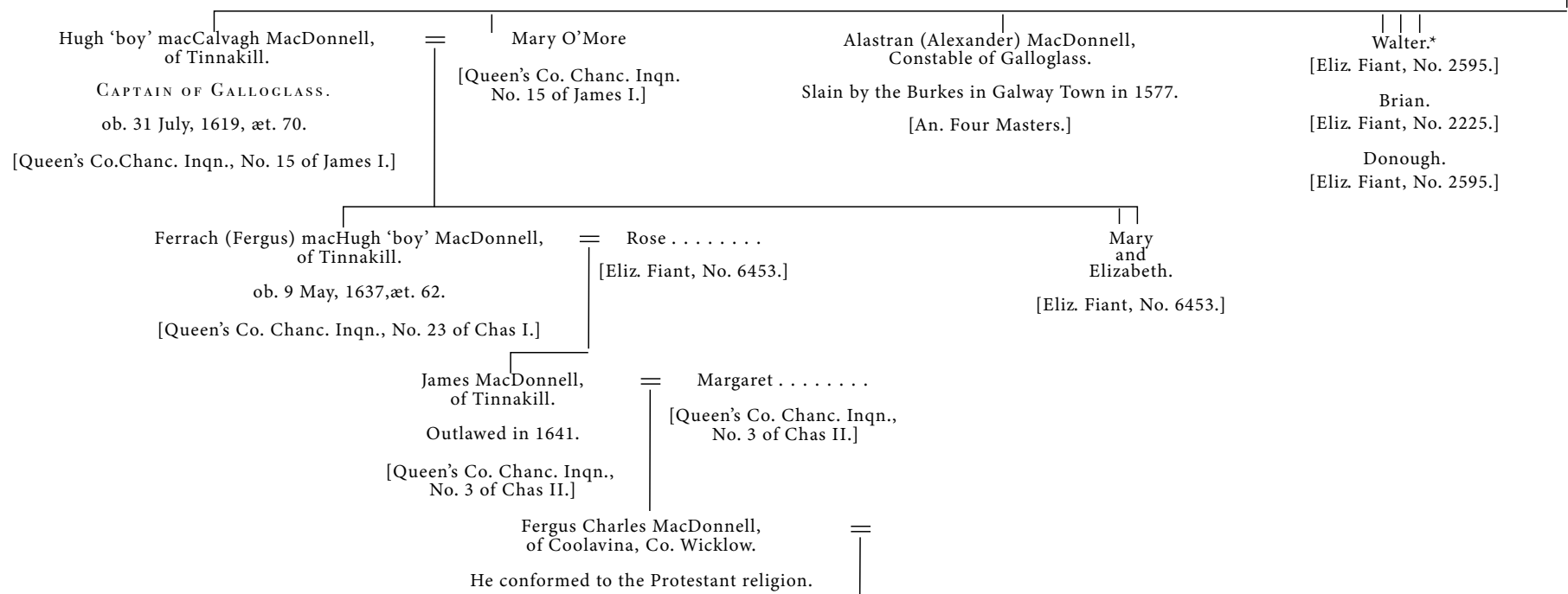
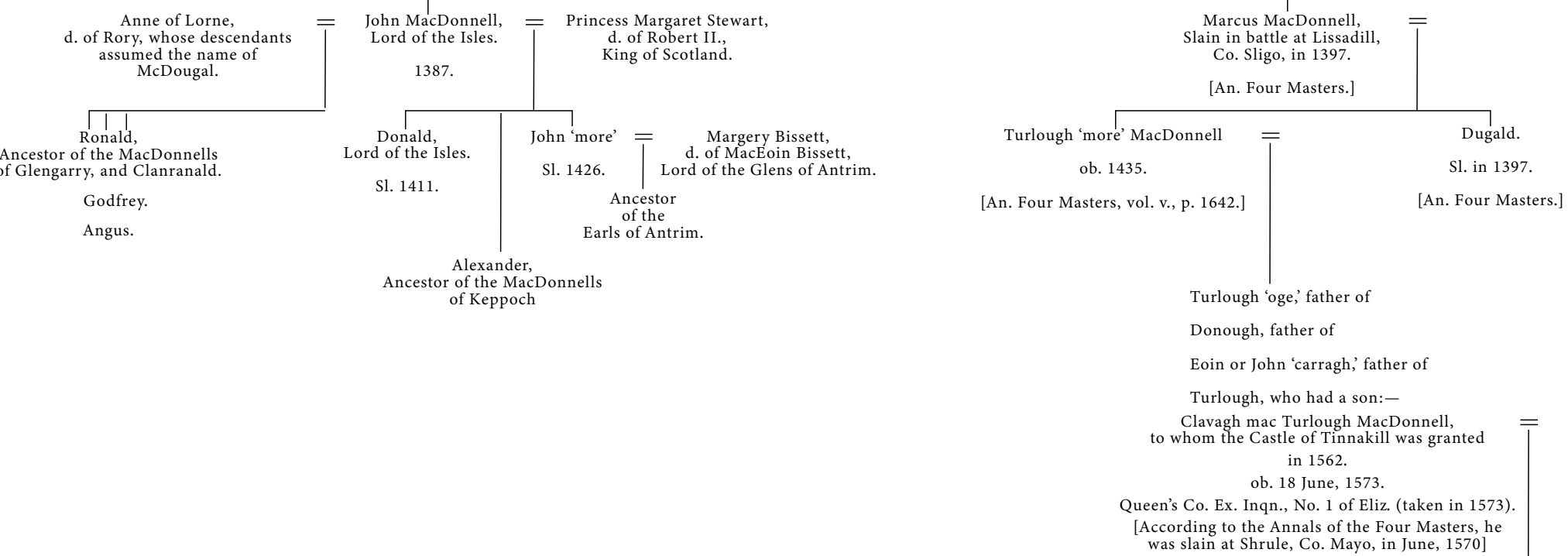
THE MACDONNELLS OF THE QUEEN'S COUNTY

I. TINNAKILL.

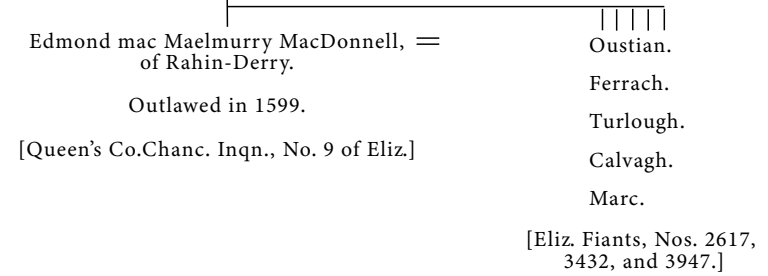

NOTE.

* "Calvagh [or Callogh] mac Walter, brother's son to Hugh 'boy' mac Callogh," in the State Papers of 1600, is stated to be "the most stirring and bloody rebel in Leinster," and after Owny mac Rory O'More, "the second best leader in the country." He was slain near Farranabin, in the Barony of Slieve Maragy, Queen's Co., on the 17th August, 1600, in an endeavour to save the life of Owny O'More. Page 395, Atkinson's Calendar of State Papers.
